

ENGL 20-2 English 20-2

5 credits, 5 hours lecture

Course Description

English 20-2 continues the format of English 10-2. The course offers instruction in various forms of communication (both oral and written). The emphasis in the course is to further develop those skills, such as vocabulary, spelling, reading, comprehension, grammar, and writing, encouraged in English 10-2. Pre and Co-requisites

Prerequisite: ENGL 10-1 or ENGL 10-2 or equivalent or permission from the Program Chair

CLO9 use handbooks and other tools (dictionary, thesaurus, grammar handbook, internet resources) to assist with text creation

CLO10 apply capitalization and punctuation conventions correctly

CLO11 apply spelling conventions consistently and independently

CLO12 identify and be able to use parts of speech correctly, revising own texts for verb consistency

CLO13 review and revise texts in progress for correct usage of unconventional punctuation for effect (nonstandard spelling, dialect, etc.)

CLO14 use common sentence structures correctly, revising texts as needed to ensure clarity

CLO15 paraphrase information, identifying both controlling ideas and supporting details

CLO16 summarize plot, setting and atmosphere CLO17

CLO17 describe conflict and identify theme

CLO18 describe character traits identified in various texts

CLO19 describe a text creator's tone, and relate it to purpose and audience

CLO20 differentiate between literal and figurative statements and identify various literary techniques

CLO21 describe visual and aural elements and their contributions to the meaning of a text

CLO22 identify common text forms and their purposes

CLO23 use strategies to gain background knowledge about history and society when studying a particular text

CLO24 identify the impact that personal context has on constructing meaning

CLO25 make use of verbal and non-verbal communications within a group setting

CLO26 analyze behavioral expectations of working in a group setting

CLO27 demonstrate appreciation of diversity of thought, expression and opinion

CLO28 analyze the parameters of public tolerance regarding the use of language
